

YOUR RIGHT TO HAVE A PSA (Prostate Specific Antigen) TEST

The Prostate Cancer Risk Management Programme and informed choice.

The Prostate Cancer Risk Management Programme aims to help the Primary Care team give clear and balanced information to asymptomatic men who request a PSA test.

Doctors are required to give the patient an unbiased account of the pros and cons of having this test.

“Any man over the age of 50 who asks for a PSA test after careful consideration of the implications should be given one.” (From Pg. 7. Information for Primary Care. PSA testing in asymptomatic men)

Prostate Cancer UK is the largest prostate cancer charity in the UK. Their booklet **‘Understanding the PSA test. A guide for men concerned about prostate cancer.’** says

“Who can have a PSA test? All men aged over 50 are entitled to have a PSA test as long as they have first talked through the pros and cons with their GP.” (Pg.5)

1 in 8 men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer. If you are over 50 and have a close relative who has had prostate cancer, you have a higher risk of developing prostate cancer (c.1 in 3 men).
